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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

State Ethics Commission - Fiscal Year 2022-2023

Agency Narrative

During the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the State Ethics Commission was able to achieve its mandate of enforcing the Ethics Reform Act (the Act) while improving efficiency and transparency.

The State Ethics Commission has four departments charged with enforcing the Act. The disclosures department assists with required filings, the non-compliance department levies fines and penalties when required filers fail to file required filings or file required filings after the statutorily established deadline, the investigations department investigates complaints, and the legal department represents the Commission during hearings and provides advisory opinions when appropriate.

During the 22-23 fiscal year, the Commission fielded 8,394 calls. This number represents a 7.6% decrease over the previous fiscal year. Decreasing the number of incoming calls for filing assistance allows Commission employees to devote more time to each caller. The decrease in the number of incoming calls can be attributed to several things: users becoming more familiar with the new filing system, increased training efforts, and the Commission's online training videos. During the 22-23 fiscal year, the executive director was charged with identifying and training public officials and public employees who have not recently received ethics training.

The non-compliance department opened 2,095 cases during the fiscal year. This represents a 5.54% increase over the previous fiscal year. The non-compliance department collected \$460,723.64 in late filing fees and penalties - this is a 14.42% increase over the previous fiscal year. Sections 8-13-140 and 8-13-150 of the Act authorizes the Commission to carry forward unexpended fines and lobbyist registration fees. This carry-forward allows the Commission to fund itself in ways that do not require funding from the General Assembly.

During the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the legal department resolved sixty-five cases - a 16% increase over the previous fiscal year. The legal department is asked to resolve cases within 180 days of a finding of probable cause; this goal was achieved in 81.53% of cases. On average, cases were resolved within 142.78 days of a finding of probable cause - a 23.38% decrease over the previous fiscal year. Due to an increase in workload, and to maintain efficiency, the Commission will be hiring an assistant general counsel during the 23-24 fiscal year.

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The Commission's investigative department presented 85 cases for probable cause during FY2022-2023 - an 8.23% increase over the previous fiscal year. Commission investigators are asked to present cases for probable cause within 180 days of case assignment. Investigators were able to meet this objective 49.41% of the time with an average case age of 264.41 days at the time of presentment. In order to increase investigative efficiency, the Commission hired two additional full-time investigators. There are now six investigators in the department.

Pursuant to recommendations made during the Commission's legislative oversight process, the Commission developed and implemented a Commission-wide telecommuting policy. This policy gives high performing employees who have demonstrated the ability to work with limited supervision the flexibility to telecommute in adherence with the Commission's telecommuting agreement.

To improve the workplace experience for Commission employees, the Commission conducted an employee survey. The survey was tailored to assess the overall satisfaction of employees and to look for areas in which the Commission could improve the employee experience which would, hopefully, increase employee satisfaction and decrease turnover. The survey results are as follows:

- 1) 92.86% of Commission employees enjoy the agency's culture.
- 2) 100% of Commission employees believe that management values their feedback.
- 3) 100% of Commission employees believe that management is transparent in decision making.
- 4) 100% of employees believe that management is supportive in times of hardship or difficulty.
- 5) 100% of Commission employees believe that they are equipped with the tools and technology needed to be successful.
- 6) Commission employees expressed a desire to have office-wide meetings more frequently so that they may better understand what challenges other departments are facing and work as a whole to attack those challenges.

In an effort to improve the complaint process, and as a response to a recommendation from the House Legislative Oversight Committee, Commission staff sent surveys to respondents containing questions about their experience during the complaint process. Commission staff received one response in which the respondent strongly agreed that:

- 1) He was treated fairly by the Commission and/or staff.
- 2) He was treated with respect before the Commission and/or staff.

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- 3) The Commission took his requests and the evidence he presented seriously.
- 4) The proceedings were clearly explained to him.
- 5) The staff was available to answer any questions he had during the process.

The Commission believes that it is important to train the state’s public officials, public members, and public employees regarding their duties under the Act. Commission staff is charged with conducting trainings – both virtually and in-person – throughout the state. During the 2022-2023 fiscal year, 964 individuals received ethics training.

Lastly, the Commission did not experience a technological or security breach during the fiscal year.

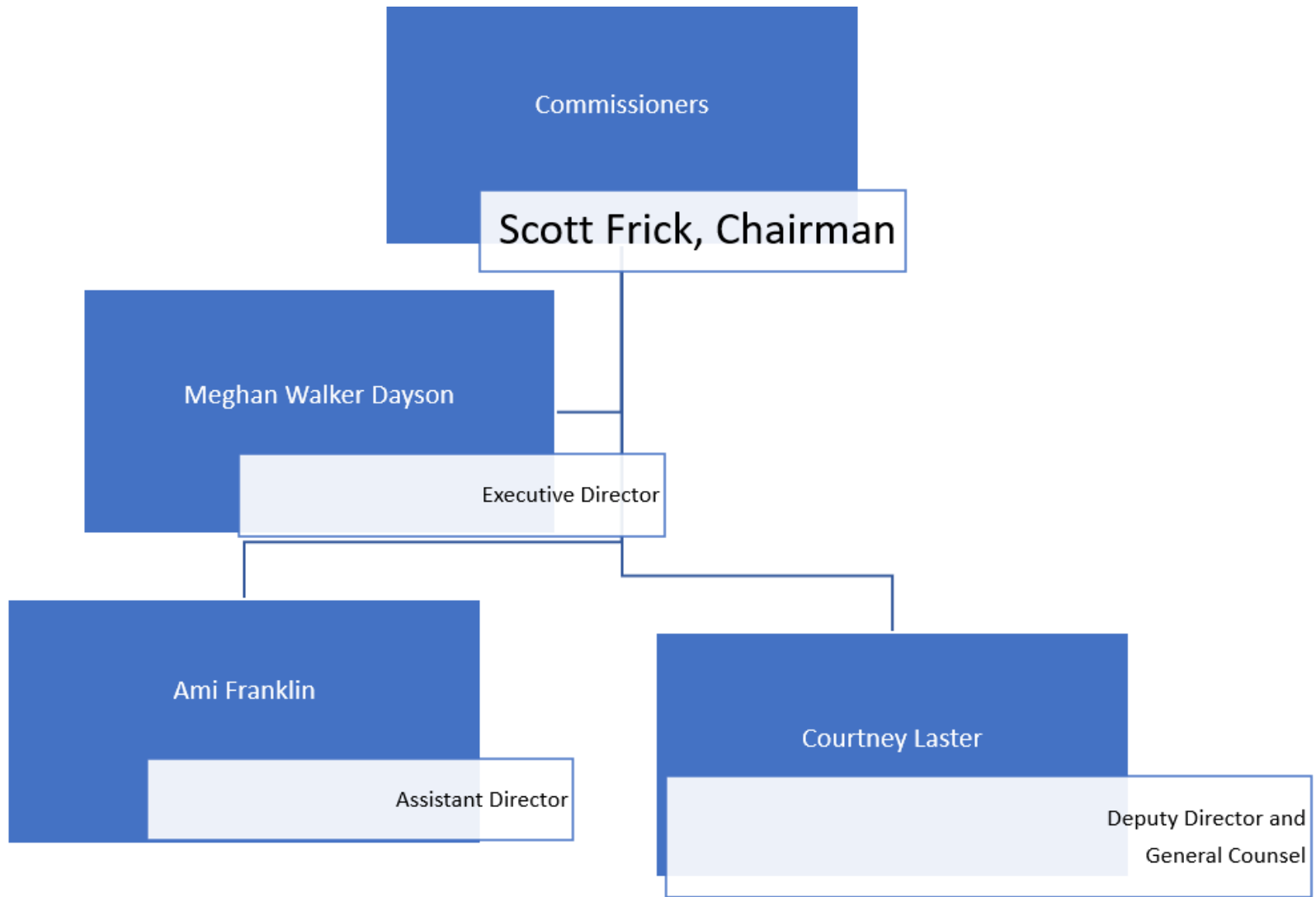
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AGENCY ORGANIZATIONAL CHART
